

Establishing a procedure for binding UNGA resolutions

Peace as defined in the UN Charter is the foundation of human security and well-being. Commitment to uphold the principles and abide by the provisions of the UN Charter by governments of member states remains mostly voluntary. Breaches of the UN Charter, in particular by governments of the P 5, remain without a speedy corrective action by the international community. In order to strengthen the capacity for the UN to intervene, it is proposed that a resolution of the GA which obtains at least $\frac{3}{4}$ of affirmative votes is considered as binding by all member states, and has to be followed by commensurate follow up action by the UN secretary-general and UN staff.
